L.A. JEWISH SYMPHONY IN CONCERT FEBRUARY 24

A thirteen-member ensemble from the Los Angeles Jewish Symphony will appear in concert at the Jewish Community Center Saturday evening, February 24. The performance, which is part of this year's JCC Concert Series, will begin at 8 pm and will feature the works of American Jewish composers Mario Castelnuovo-Tedesco,

Leon Stein, Robert Strassburg, Lucas Richman, George Gershwin and Aaron Copland.

The Los Angeles Jewish Symphony debuted in 1994 with musicians drawn from the ranks of the Los Angeles Philharmonic, the L.A. Chamber Orchestra, local symphonies and top studio performers. In two remarkable seasons under the artistic direction of Noreen Green, the orchestra has won critical acclaim from audiences, musicians and reviewers.

Green, who was born and raised in Los Angeles, has long been active in Jewish music. Much of her background relates to choral music; she received her doctor of musical arts degree in choral music from the University of Southern California and is west coast director of the Nowakowsky Foundation, performing and editing the works of the 19th-century Russian liturgical composer David Nowakowsky - so the symphony was somewhat of a departure for her. Additionally, the Rocky Mountains might seem like a strange place for the conception of a Jewish music group, but that is exactly where, with encouragement from former Long Beach Symphony conductor Murray Sidlin, she was inspired to found the orchestra.

An important component of the Los Angeles Jewish Symphony's approach to Jewish music performance is Green's introduction to the concert selections. She speaks about each piece and its relation to the theme of the program. "I want the audience to have an active part in the music-making experience," Green explained. "And I have been inspired by Leonard Bernstein and his Music for the Young."

According to Los Angeles Times reviewer Josef Woodard, the Los Angeles Jewish Symphony has been an important and impressive addition to the L.A. classical music scene, enhancing the cultural spectrum with its commitment to Jewish musicians and composers.

Tickets for the concert are now on sale at the Center reception desk, by mail with check made payable to the JCC or by phone charge with VISA or MasterCard. The fee is \$12 (\$10 for JCC members). Tickets will also be available at the auditorium box office one hour prior to the 8 pm performance.
